FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

In Luke's account of Jesus' baptism (Luke 3:15-16, 21-22), Jesus simply appears as one of the crowd who was given "a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (Luke 3:3). Only after the baptism, while Jesus is in prayer, does the Spirit appear as a dove and the voice of God sound out from the sky. Many people ask why Jesus came for baptism, since He was without sin. Ritual cleansing was a regular part of Jewish practice before the Sabbath, after periods of uncleanness, and in preparation for great battles. John's baptism was a specific call to turn away from wrongdoing and turn toward God. So persuasive was his preaching that many of his followers wondered if he was the Messiah. He quickly corrects that idea. As we hear today, his is a baptism of water only. The Anointed One will baptize with the Spirit and fire — a sign of God's judgment for all. When He is baptized by John, Jesus acknowledges John's authority as a man of God, and also Jesus participates in a public sign of His absolute obedience and reliance on God. For Luke, Jesus is the last person to be baptized by John, the culmination of John's ministry. The words that are heard from the heavens are similar to Isaiah 42:1 ("My servant...my chosen...in whom my soul delights"), and they express Luke's understanding that this is the beginning of the messianic era.

WHAT DID YOU GET FOR CHRISTMAS?

As children head back to school, they'll either ask— or answer — that natural question: "What did you get for Christmas?" Some children don't get many presents. Maybe their family can't afford it. Or they've decided to focus less on the material aspects of the holidays. Either way, we can use this situation to teach our children a lesson in humility. First, if they did get a lot of gifts, we can tell them how bragging makes us look bad and others feel worse. And by not asking the question of their classmates, they might prevent hurt feelings. *Holiday gifts are wonderful... but holiday humility is even better.*

According to the Church's Liturgical calendar, the Christmas season ends with the **Baptism of the Lord** (this year on January 10th). This feast begins Ordinary Time of the Liturgical year. It celebrates Jesus' Baptism and marks the beginning of His public ministry, as recounted in the first verses of Mark's Gospel. —Provided by the Marriage and Family Life Office, Diocese of Columbus

BAPTISM AND LIFE

"Whoever is moved by love begins to perceive what 'life' really is. He begins to perceive the meaning of the word of hope that we encountered in the Baptismal Rite: from faith I await 'eternal life' — the true life which, whole and unthreatened, in all its fullness, is simply life. Jesus, who said that He had come so that we might have life and have it in its fullness, in abundance (cf. Jn 10:10), has also explained to us what 'life' means: 'this is eternal life, that they know you the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent' (Jn 17:3). Life in its true sense is not something we have exclusively in or from ourselves: it is a relationship. And life in its totality is a relationship with him who is the source of life. If we are in relation with him who does not die, who is Life itself and Love itself, then we are in life. Then we 'live.'"
